The SFWSC is judged by a panel of the spirit industry's most renowned judges, who start the competition with a blind taste test and evaluate each spirit on an individual basis.

BUFFALO TRACE DISTILLERY'S FIFTEENTH ANNUAL 5K RACE TOOK PLACE THIS JULY 4TH

First Place Female Breaks Race Record; Nearly \$14,000 Donated to local V.F.W for city fireworks show

FRANKFORT, FRANKLIN COUNTY, KY (July 6, 2016) – There was more to celebrate at Buffalo Trace Distillery's Great Buffalo Chase 5K than it being the 15th annual race, when the record for the best female time was broken by three seconds. Held the morning of July 4th, participants came from all over the nation to take part in the race, rain or shine.

Monicah Ngige was the top female runner with a finishing time of 15:49, breaking the top female record by three seconds, and earning her an additional \$1,000 bonus in addition to her \$3,000 first place purse. Following behind Ngige for second and third place were Nancy Nzisa with a time of 15:58 and Gladys Kipsoi with a time of 16:08.

John Wanjiku was the top male runner and finished with a time of 13:44:8. Very close behind him for second place was Silas Kipruto at 13:44:9. It was a nail bitter to say the least. In third place was Hillary Too with a time of 13:46.

To start off the festivities, a finalist from the television show "America's Got Talent," Benton Blount, sang the national anthem as runners took their mark, and WKYT television news anchor Amber Philpott was onsite to emcee the event. The race started promptly at 8 a.m.

After the race, an award ceremony was held for the top runners for male and female as well as for each age group. Cash prizes as well as trophies were awarded to the top male and female runners to commemorate their win.

The top six overall male and female runners were awarded in the following amounts: \$3,000 for first place, \$2,500 for second place, \$2,000 for third place, \$1,000 for fourth place, \$500 for fifth place, and \$250 for sixth place. Special to this year's race one-time only cash prizes

were given to the fourth through sixth place male and female runners in addition to awarding the top three overall male and female runners as per tradition.

The certified race route started on Distillery grounds and wound through historic aging warehouses, production facilities and lots of beautiful scenery before finishing up at the Visitor's Center. Runners were given commemorative 15th anniversary T-shirts showing how the Great Buffalo Chase has evolved over the past 15 years. Representatives from Buffalo Trace Distillery will present the check from the race proceeds to VFW Post 4075 later this month, which they will use to fund the annual Fourth of July fireworks show for the city of Frankfort.

Starting a New School Year, the Healthy Way

Tips for a Healthy Back to School Transition

Cincinnati (August 18, 2015) – August has officially started, which means the school year is vastly approaching. It is time to bring out the lunchboxes, backpacks and the number two pencils. Before starting that back to school shopping, Gwendolyn Welsh, MD, The Christ Hospital Physicians – Primary Care recommends following these tips for a healthy back to school transition:

1. Establish an early routine. At least two weeks before school starts adjust your child's schedule. For example, change their bedtime to make sure they get at least eight to nine hours of sleep. Many kids need at least nine hours or more to get a good night sleep.
2. Good eating habits start early. It is important to have a good breakfast to start your day. Some kids can be picky so take them to the grocery store with you so they can pick healthy foods that they will enjoy. Also, lunch plays a role with how the rest of the day will go, make sure they have at least two to three items that are healthy.
3. Get acquainted with the school. Some kids might be heading to a different building within the district. Before school starts try to bring your child to their school so they can see where their classroom is and their locker or cubby is located. It will help your child to be less stressed or nervous on the first day. If you have any concerns, make sure to contact your child's teacher before school starts so they are aware of your concerns.
4. Check the school bus route and safety. Before the first day, make sure your child knows their bus number and what time the bus arrives. When your child is on the bus, make sure they know the rules set by the National Safety Council. For example, they should learn the hand sign the bus drivers gives when it is ok to cross the street.
5. Exercise. After a long school day, it is important that kids get at least an hour or more of physical activity. It gives their brain a break as well as helps them sleep better at night. Also, you can join them as well so you can get your daily dose of exercise.
6. Support. Talk to your child before school starts and set some goals for this coming school year as well as set expectations you want from them. Also, try talking to them more about their day. Usually the only response parents get from their kids after school is "fine" or "good". It might be difficult at first, but be sure to ask every day.

Protect Yourself during the Holiday Weekend *The Survival Guide for the Fourth of July*

Cincinnati (July 2, 2015) – July has finally arrived, which means it is time to start grilling up some barbeque, take out your swimsuits and get some great exercise at your community pool. And while you are having fun in the sun during your Fourth of July weekend, you always have to be cautious about your safety.

Jeffery Craven, MD, of The Christ Hospital Physicians – Urgent Care recommends you follow these safety tips to help keep you safe during the holiday weekend:

Firework Safety

Always read and follow the label. It is important that you read every single detail on the firework directions and warnings.

Always have water handy. Just in case a fire was to happen make sure you have a garden hose or a bucket of water handy to extinguish a flame. It's also recommended to wear safety goggles at all times when attempting to set off fireworks.

Only light fireworks on smooth, flat surface. Nothing around the fireworks should be flammable like dry leaves and should not be facing the house.

Only one is enough. Light only one firework at a time.

Never approach a 'dud' or failed firework without precaution. Douse a failed firework with water before approaching it.

Dispose of fireworks properly. First soak them in water and dispose of them in a trash can.

Always wear eye protection. Fireworks are known to do more damage on the eyes and can cause serious injuries. Before you light up a firework make sure you have protective goggles on.

Water Safety

Learn CPR. It is important that all people of all ages know how to perform CPR. Just remember to call 911, do 30 compressions on the chest and give two breathes. Knowing those three steps can save someone's life.

Never swim alone. Make sure that you always have someone with you while you swim just in case something were to occur.

Never dive, unless you know how deep the water is. Diving into a shallow pool can cause major head injuries. Instead jump in legs first.

Know your limits. Do not go into areas of water that you cannot handle.

Wear a life preserver when boating. While boating you never know what will happen, so be prepared ahead of time by wearing a life preserver even when you know how to swim.

Bug Spray Safety

Follow the label. Every bug spray is different so make sure you read the label before applying to your skin.

Apply repellent sparingly. Spray only on exposed skin or clothing. Keep out of eyes. The hours around dusk are when mosquitos are most active.

Avoid high-concentration products on skin. Unless you are under a high risk for disease use a low concentration. For pregnant women and small children use under 30% DEET concentration, the active ingredient in bug repellent. Children two months to two years old should have insect repellent applied to their skin more than once in 24 hours. If you do not want to apply the spray to your skin, it can be applied to clothing around the pant cuff and neck line areas, and on your socks.

Do not inhale. After applying do not breathe in or swallow the repellent. It can cause bug spray poisoning.

Thoroughly wash. Wash repellent off the skin after being bitten by an insect is gone.

“Fourth of July weekend is always a great weekend to spend time with friends and family, but sometimes people can overlook safety,” said Dr. Craven. “You can still have fun, but they can also be safe at the same time. Do not overlook the small things and double check your surroundings before you light up the first firework of the night.”

Wild Pig Game Chase

Lexington, Ky. – Sept. 27, 2016 – The old pigskin went flying through the Big Blue Nation, bringing it home for a touchdown at Commonwealth Stadium. A truck taking the pig to Honey Hill Farm mobile zoo crashed at the intersection of University and Alumni at 9:23 a.m., releasing the gigantic pig onto the streets. The game was on.

First quarter started with the pig dashing its way to the Shawnee Place neighborhood and into a garage. Laura Lee Hobbs and two other students cornered the pig and went for the tackle. The pig dodged the tackle and spirited to the streets. From there, police were called into play.

“We tried to catch the pig while it was running down the sidewalk... I grabbed it, but it was too big. It broke free and headed northeast,” stated Officer John Kirkwood, the responding officer during the second half of the chase.

During halftime, Kirkwood called for more teammates to join in on the game. By the end of halftime, police were getting reports of pig sighting from people in Shawnee Point. Starting the third quarter, the police cornered the pig in Edgar Coleman’s background. However, the pig could not be blocked, even with four police officers at hand. Police from there called for their second stringers, animal control.

The pig ended up at Commonwealth Stadium, blinded sided by the police

officer and animal control cars that surrounded it. The sirens for the end fourth quarter went off and the game was over.

“It nearly got hit by the campus bus,” said Officer Kirkwood, after the pig was caught.

Once the game was over, the old pigskin retired to the petting zoo to rest from its last game. No players were injured and minor damages were made in Shawnee Point. More action was seen on this Tuesday morning than the typical Saturday University of Kentucky football game.

Lexington, Ky. – Nov. 10, 2016 – Imagine looking into the honest eyes of Abraham Lincoln or staring into the stern, yet calm face of George Washington many people would say it's not possible, but modern artwork makes it possible. Not only can people view presidential history, but people can look back on how politics have transformed after centuries of leadership in a hall of presidents.

To commemorate the election year, the University of Kentucky Art Museum displayed a small collection of the United States of America's past presidents. Under the exhibit name President of the United States or POTUS students as well as the Lexington community can view exclusive works of art for free and get a closer look into the faces of past and future leaders.

The United States of America has voted in 44 presidents since 1789 and now Donald Trump will be 45 after Inauguration Day on January 20, 2017. The Art Museum showed turning points in American politics as well as keep up with current events in its collections.

“This is the first time we've done a collection based on the presidential election. The joy of the space we currently have is that we can respond quickly to current events,” said Janie Welker, the Curator of Exhibits and Collections of the University of Kentucky Art Museum.

The collection includes work from the museum's permanent collection and consists of unique pieces filled with work from 1795 to the current year of 2016. The

piece getting the most attention from the collection is the *Portrait of George Washington* created by Gilbert Stuart.

“We are very fortunate to have the *Portrait of George Washington* in our collection. That piece as well as the *Head of Abraham Lincoln* created by Gutzon Borglum are two of my favorite pieces in our permanent collection,” stated Welker. “Both are very big on imagery.”

Within the collection, one unique piece of art that grabs viewers’ attention immediately. Actor, director and producer, Harry Shearer, created a video clip called *Dose Dems*, which included never before seen clips of candidates from the 2008 Democratic election: Hillary Clinton, Barack Obama and Joe Biden.

Shearer compiled various videos by discovering satellite news feeds while working on *Saturday Night Live* in the 1980s. From there, he started collecting and sharing the videos on his website. *Dose Dems* is a small collection from his larger project of video loops entitled *The Silent Echo Chamber*.

The video shows each of the presidential nominees before interviews began or sometimes during an actual interview, where the nominee is the only one seen and heard. Viewers can watch Obama preparing for interviews by reading a newspaper, while Biden eats a donut before speaking to the public. Shearer’s goal was to make viewers think about their own assumptions, opinions, trust and truth.

“The video is what grabs people’s attention when it shows mocking and jarring

sides of a person. It's interesting to see reactions from the audience," stated Welker.

To bring the current election into the collection, the Art Museum commissioned Lexington local artist, Joel Feldman, to create intricate pieces of watercolor paintings and drawings. Feldman started the *Commentary* collection during the first round of candidates for the 2016 presidency election, and he generated more than 100 satiric works in the past several months from the election.

In each canvas, candidates like Hillary Clinton, Ted Cruz, Marco Rubio, Bernie Sanders and now President-Elect Donald Trump, are depicted with the opinions and concerns of American citizens. The concerns portrayed in his collection consisted of violence, the media and the United States of America economy. Some of the collection also showed robots and aliens, which is supposed to symbolize how people are caught up in the political movement.

Other pieces in the collection include work from Edward Sorel and Paul Szep. Szep took a cartoon spin on one of the biggest scandals in American history, the Watergate Scandal, while Sorel takes a comical drawing approach on past government leaders.

"The entire POTUS collection shows a turning point for a way people view the government. It's really a turning point in American politics," said Welker. "We wanted the collection to be corky and focus more on current politics today."

The University of Kentucky Art Museum are regularly changing its collection

so it can reflect current issues. In the future, there's potential for the election collection to return for viewing.

“Never say never,” stated Welker. “When it comes to deciding what collection to display in the museum, we bounce ideas based on current events.”

Students and the community can view the POTUS until November 27, 2016. After that time, the collection will be taken down and replaced with another collection. The museum is open on Tuesday through Sunday, but hours vary depending on the day.

As this election year comes to a close, the POTUS exhibit makes Americans think about how far the country has come as well as continue to watch as politics evolve in years to come. People currently are feeling either happy or upset about the results from the election, but when looking at a hall of faces of past leaders, like George Washington and Honest Abe, people can find inspiration.
